Spiritual Stargazing

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. . .for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself. . . (Isaiah 43:18-19)

[W]ise men from the East came to Jerusalem asking "Where is the child who has been born King of the Jews?" For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." (Matthew 2:1b-2)

It seems odd that through the prophet Isaiah the Lord asks the people "not to remember." Isn't our faith about remembering? Isn't the whole point to remember what God has done, who God is, and respond to that? How could remembering be so problematic?

I pondered this scripture and began to wonder if the problem the Lord was addressing was that a new journey could not begin until the old ways of the would-be travelers were released, with gratitude. Perhaps people were not yet ready to take on new ventures, ones that would have their challenges, if "the ways things were" were always on the minds of those on the journey.

This usually takes time to do. It is not the work of a day, or an hour, but learning to live knowing there is an ebb and flow to all things. It takes us, as individuals, different amounts of time to come to that point, and we all have to do at our own pace, whatever the issue might be.

The Isaiah passage also speaks about noticing the new in their midst. Being watchful for new things is a spiritual discipline unto itself. The wise men who traveled to Bethlehem came because they saw a star rise in the sky. I doubt that Jerusalem was on their "bucket list." Instead they noticed this sign, wondered at this marvelous new thing, and began a journey that led them to the baby Jesus and his mother Mary at home. If they had not noticed the star, the journey would not have been made, and the holy experience would have been missed, the gifts never given. They were willing to risk approaching King Herod, a king who was noted for killing those who disagreed with him, in order to find the child.

This month, we are beginning a new sermon series called Trip of a Lifetime, in which 2017

we examine what it means to be on this journey of faith with Jesus. We begin with the wise men's journey to Jerusalem and back home, then continue on through the baptism of Jesus and the disciples who learned what it meant to remain with Jesus and learn his ways.

As we journey, let's try out the faith practices of letting go with gratitude and seeing with new eyes. Our world depends on those who know how to see when something new is appearing - to name it lovingly, to share it with others, and to begin the journey it requires.

Are you a stargazer? I hope so.

A Year of Hymns: What are Those Little Numbers?

Our hymn singing tradition is well over 1,500 years old in text and tune, so the

question is, what makes them last? Why do some fall by the wayside and others don't? This year I would like to look at some of our hymns in greater detail, learning their history, and in turn creating a greater appreciation for some of those tunes which are our favorites and others a few might grumble over. In order to understand why many texts and tunes have lasted hundreds of years, we first must understand their construction, beginning with the poetry.



Have you ever noticed those little numbers at the bottom of a hymn? (Find a hymn in our *Glory to God* hymnal and

look for the little numbers or letters on the bottom right below the music). For example: 8.6.8.6, 8.8.8.8, 10.10.10, or sometimes letters like LM or CM. These represent the poetic meter of the text, each number corresponding to the number of syllables per line. When the poetic meter is described by letters (CM, LM, SM, etc.) they correspond to frequently used meters. For example, CM is defined as Common Meter which is always 8.6.8.6.

Let's look at a hymn text in Common Meter:

O God, our help in a-ges past (8 syllable line) our hope for years to come, (6) our shel-ter from the storm-y blast, (8) and our e-ter-nal home. (6)

I hope this is an "aha!" moment for some! Now, with this basic understanding for counting poetic meter, let's see if you can figure out the numbers for one of our oldest hymn texts, "Of the Father's Love Begotten." Here is the first verse:


Of the Father's love begotten, ere the worlds began to be, he is Alpha and Omega;

he the source, the ending he,

of the things that are that have been, and that future years shall see, evermore and evermore!

This hymn text was written in the 5th Century by a retired Romano Spanish lawyer around the same time as the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds were being codified. You can see the value of a text that stands beside these creeds which are pillars of our theology. *Did you count the syllables?* Answer: 8.7.8.7.8
