Holding Fast to Jesus: A Lenten Reflection

"And the Spirit immediately drove [Jesus] out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him."

Mark 1:12-13

"The Bible doesn't repeat itself, but often it rhymes." - N.T. Wright

Seasons govern our lives. Rhythms give life definition. The church in her wisdom, prior to the revolutions of industry and technology, listened to and learned from the rhythms of the seasons and sought to leverage time as a tool for teaching the story of Jesus contained in the library of the Scriptures. This is why we have the liturgical calendar: an annual cycle that connects us to the life of King Jesus in order to form us -- daily and over time -- as His followers.



We find ourselves, in the midst of the season of Lent, the 40-day season of fasting and prayer patterned after Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. During this season, many people give up something or commit to a specific spiritual discipline in order to confront the parts of us disconnected from God. For some of us, observing Lent is a central part of our discipleship. For others, Lent is something we are vaguely familiar with or it is something completely new. Wherever you are, gaining clarity about Jesus' time facing temptation in the wilderness can help us deeply engage with Lent.

The most significant component of Jesus' temptation has to do with food. Matthew tells us in his gospel that Jesus does not eat for 40 days or nights. This is significant because on page two of the Bible, after God has created the world and male and female in God's image, and after they are placed in a garden over which they have been given dominion and freedom to eat anything except the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, we are told Adam and Eve were tempted by a snake and ended up eating the forbidden fruit. This act of disobedience results in their exile from the Garden of Eden, out from the graciously ordered existence with God and into the chaotic wilderness of a world separated from God.

Jesus' fasting in the face of temptation in the wilderness is a theological do-over. Where the first humans failed in their ability to resist temptation in the form of food, Jesus is obedient. It is important to note that Jesus was not explicitly tempted until the end of the 40-day fast. It is only when Jesus was "famished" (Matt. 4:2) that the tempter arrived, offering what exactly? Food. More precisely, the temptation for Jesus to turn rocks into bread.

Jesus was clearly physically hungry as he faced temptation, but what enabled him to overcome temptation was the fact that his spirit was overflowing with the love and promises of God. Starving the flesh (the Biblical word for your physical existence with all its desires and appetites) in order to feed the spirit (the Biblical word for the divine part of you that longs for connection with God) is the primary purpose of fasting. This is not only how we too can fight off temptation, but how we become more of who we were created to be. For me, fasting is becoming an important spiritual practice which I think is critically important for our church also.

The significance of Jesus' fasting, and the Lenten invitation to imitate Jesus in this manner, are both theological and profoundly practical. Americans in the 21st-century have a complicated relationship with food. Our full refrigerators, stocked pantries, and abundant opportunities to drive through and dine out confront us with the greatest temptation of all -- to succumb to the illusion we are able materially to provide for ourselves with respect to food and that is all we need to thrive. Jesus reminds us this is patently false, and Lent invites us into a period of learning to trust Jesus about this.

When we fast from a specific meal, or day of meals, we learn from our bodies that our physical hunger pangs are derivative of our hunger for God. Fasting, however, is not a crash diet, nor is it giving up a specific thing like sweets for a short period of time. It is not about diet modification to attempt to achieve a culturally contrived image of physical attractiveness. Fasting during Lent is about learning what we can live without.


Within the bounds of what is safe and healthy for you, what would it look like for you to fast in some way during the remainder of Lent? Maybe it's fasting from one meal per week, or one meal per day, or one day per week. Fasting as a spiritual discipline involves letting your hunger drive you to prayer, for more of God's presence in your life and in our community. If and when you fast, take Jesus' advice and don't make a fuss about it by drawing attention to yourself. Let your fasting bring to the fore other areas in your life you can live without which minimize or detract from your connection to God.

Fasting as a spiritual discipline can place us on the way to receiving the wisdom from Jesus Lent has to offer.

Taizé has an interesting history. Coming out of the desolation of WWII, a man known as Brother Roger founded a small community of Christians in the French town of Taizé. Seeking to create a community of healing and refuge after the war, Brother Roger started the Taizé community to create a space for people to find God in the midst of brokenness. From this worshiping community, a very intimate and contemplative service evolved.

I am excited about the opportunity to host a Taizé service during Lent and hope that you join in the simplicity of the service and season.

Are you new to UPC and interested in learning more about what we are all about?


Are you curious about becoming a member or being baptized for the first time?

Baptism + Confirmation for Youth Begins March 4




