



Saying Goodbye





This is my last newsletter column as your Transitional Pastor. As most of you know by now, August 13 is my last Sunday with you, and shortly after that, your new pastor, the Reverend Renn Serna, is coming to serve with you as your new pastor. I am heading to San Jose, to serve as Transitional Pastor to First United Methodist Church of San Jose, where I start in September.

It's both hard and easy to realize that I've been with University Presbyterian Church a little over

two years. It's hard to realize because I can still remember joining you in this in-between time of ministry, and in some ways, it seems like just yesterday. On the other hand, when I look back on all the things that have happened in my time at UPC, it seems longer than it was.

In this short time together, there has been "ministry in the meantime." The Children's Program has been reworked and a new Godly Play curriculum speaks to our young disciples. The Columbarium, a long-term project, came to fruition and we dedicated it on Ash Wednesday 2016. A youth-initiated Community Garden now offers our food pantry customers fresh produce. The Buildings and Grounds ministry initiated and completed a solar project in the parking lot. A new Stewardship Committee is focusing on the "why" of giving. More recently, Session approved a new partnership with the Woven worshiping community, FIRM, and the Synod of the Pacific to provide ESL tutors to recently-arrived Syrian refugees, and training has begun. All of these things, and more, are due to you and your faithfulness to God's work here at UPC and in the world.

Now it's time for me to move on to bring some healing with another congregation in need of a transitional pastor. For me, it's a bittersweet time, as I've connected and come to love and appreciate you. I know I will miss you.

I want to be clear about what it means for a pastor to leave serving a congregation. First, because I will no longer be serving among you, it is important for you to know I am not available to come back to perform pastoral services among you. You'll be getting acquainted with Renn in short order, and of course, Dustin is continuing his ministry among you. In order for you to bond with them, it's important you go to the two of them, and not call on the previous clergy who have served you.

Finally, I'd like to end by saying thank you. Thank you for welcoming me, a stranger in your midst. Thank you for honoring the gifts I brought, and your graciousness when I fell short of the mark. Thank you for your faithfulness in these times of transition, and all your hard work. Thank you for this time, which I will treasure always.




UPC's long and unique history. Our middle and high school students will continue to lead and serve our monthly food ministry, as well as fill other roles of leadership and service within our community.

Solar at UPC: A Six-Month Update



It's been six months since our Solar Plant started generating renewable energy to our campus, and we want to provide an update on where we are so far with our Solar Plant and our Synod 'Green' Loan.

First, here's a bit of history. At the Session Retreat in January 2016, our elders made a wish list of things to accomplish. One item on the list was to have a Solar Plant. In 2015, UPC spent over \$21,000 for electricity, and it was estimated energy costs would rise 6.7% in each succeeding year. So, the goal was to switch to renewable energy to save money and to be better stewards of our planet.

Led by Mel Enns, an incredible amount of due diligence ensued. We learned we needed to work quickly to get the plant up and running by the end of the calendar year in order to lock into existing

PG&E rates. Four solar companies presented proposals and we decided to go with Barrier Solar. Next, we decided to build the solar plant in the parking lot rather than placing solar panels on the sanctuary roof. The cost was \$148,600 so we researched various loan options and decided to go with a PC(USA) Synod Green Loan at 3.5% fixed for 15 years, with monthly payments of \$1,062.32 (\$12,748 yearly). At 2016 electricity rates, our initial yearly savings were projected to be \$8,250.

The plant became fully operational on December 29, 2016, thus we locked in 2016 PG&E rates with two days to spare. With solar, Barrier Solar estimated our PG&E bill for electricity (taxes, etc.) would be a few hundred dollars annually, and so we budgeted \$500 for 2017. We won't know for sure what our final bill will be in December, but each month we get a bill from PG&E with estimates based on energy used and renewable energy generated. As of the end of June, our estimated charges are -\$252 (note this is minus \$252).

Synod loaned us 100% of the cost of the project with the caveat that in 2017 UPC would raise a 'delayed down payment' of 10% of the loan (\$14,860) which would be applied directly towards the principal. Through your generosity, in less than three months we raised the entire down payment, and more. And, you have continued to support the project with donations that go directly to pay down the loan principal. Currently our loan balance is \$119,182.

If you want to continue helping to reduce the principal on this loan, please designate "Solar" in the memo Line of your check.

Mission in Action

One day last fall, as I was volunteering in a first grade classroom at Wolters Elementary School; the door opened and in walked three Syrian refugee children. They had recently arrived in the United States and spoke no English. The classroom teacher asked me to work with them, and I did, even though I had no idea where to begin. They didn't know what I was saying and vice versa, so I hoped my smile and gentle tone of voice would help put them at ease.

From then until the end of the school year, I worked with them for one hour, two mornings a week, an experience I would describe as both frustrating (especially at first) and rewarding (increasingly so, as time went by).



As we worked on the ABC's and simple words and sentences; I got to know each child (two boys, one girl) better, and to appreciate their unique personalities. One of the boys had been badly burned at age five in a bombing in Syria, an explosion that killed his mother. His visible scars are all too fresh a testimony to the trials these children, their families, and millions of their countrymen have endured over the past six years.

By the end of the school year "my kids," as I call them, were speaking rudimentary English. Several other volunteers and I arranged to make home visits to continue their education over the summer. So, I'm still teaching English to my three kids (plus two

others!) two mornings a week in one of their apartments. Being exposed to their culture has been eye-opening and enriching for me, and I feel increasingly privileged to be able to work with these children, bond with them, and help them have a positive learning experience in their new country.

Another Opportunity to Help Syrian Refugees in Fresno: UPC is partnering with Fresno Interdenominational Refugee Ministries (FIRM) and the Woven worshiping community to work with Syrian refugees in one-on-one tutoring for English language skills through iPad and software.
